

1999 - Another Wonderful Year of Achievements

Each year we try to undertake projects to stretch the limits of what we do. Although the number of adoptions we do each year is high, it is hard to increase due to the ever increasing number of adoption programs across the nation. We still continue to fly greyhounds to different parts of our country and send our advocacy message with them. NGAP has flown more greyhounds than probably anyone else ever. U.S. Airways continues to fly our greyhounds and has flown between 2,500 - 3,000 greyhounds at this point. We continue to shadow greyhound racing activities and bear down on them whenever we find proveable abuse or exploitation.

This past summer a greyhound arrived at our facility that was ten years old. He had the worst teeth of any dog we had ever seen. He had come from a breeding facility and had been used for a stud. That in itself was bad enough, but the person that was responsible to care for this greyhound was a veterinarian which made this inexcuseable. It was very clear what we needed to do. We filed charges against Dr. David Moses of Ocala, Florida, with the Florida Parimutuel Division, Ocala Animal Control and the State Veterinary Board. The case is still ongoing. Most adoption programs would have just swept it under the rug and not made an issue of it - not at NGAP!

The big project for 1999 was to purchase necessary equipment to perform orthopedic surgery. For many months we started accumulating some of the instruments, but we had no one to perform the surgery. Gay Latimer, our Virginia affiliate, finally got ahold of Dr. Spencer Johnston from Virginia Tech in Blacksburg, Virginia and he drove up and performed our first orthopedic surgery. This year we have taken a much closer look at coagulation problems with our female greyhounds. We tested approximately 10% (about thirty) of the greyhounds we considered to be candidates to have the Von Willabrands factor. All thirty tested positive. In the year 2000 we expect to expand on these studies.

A GREYHOUND PRAYER

When I die, let it be as a pet. So that someone will remember me! Our surgical facility has been up and running for about four years and for the last 1 ½ years we have been putting together a new surgical facility that when completed this year should be a true showpiece. Its being built from the ground up, and all of the equipment will be the most modern available. We invite everyone to come and visit!

In March we performed a leg amputation for the first time on a greyhound we suspected had a malignant tumor in its wrist. Our appraisal was correct and it is now one year later and Chelsea is doing fine.


There is no doubt in our minds that we have performed more dental procedures on greyhounds than any other facility in the country. We now use several different techniques and it is our belief that our veterinarians are highly skilled in this area.

Now as we begin our 11th year many of our greyhounds are dying. Most from cancer. Most of these cancers are shoulder related. Of course, more canines die of cancer than any other reason, but it is my belief that racing has a significant impact on earlier cancer in the greyhound breed. The year 2000 will be another exciting year for us and we look to answer many of the questions that we don't have answers for as we continue our quest to find loving homes for our fast friends.



RESCUE REVISITED

It was back in 1993 in middle of the winter, I was on my way to Florida to visit my winter vacation home. While en route, I received a call about two greyhounds that had been found in the Biscayne Bay Area (near Miami) of Florida. We told the person that had found the dogs to take them to the vet that we were working with. Unfortunately, by the time she got there the vet was closed and could not help her. We ultimately arranged to meet her late that evening. She drove up to our condo in a small, two door car and in it was a mom and a pup. They were not purebred. This poor lady had gone through so much we decided to help anyway. She had no way to keep them so she kept them in here car and slept with them overnight. We could not arrange to get the dogs flown to Philadelphia until the following Monday, so we decided we would try and have Donna Forrester (a greyhound rescue person), in Fort Myers, take care of the dogs for us and then fly them to Philadelphia. The dogs were now were named Biscayne Katie and the pup was named Salty (after the restaurant where she was found). When we arrived at Donna Forrester she would not take our dogs into her facility and we had to bring them back. That's the first part of the story.

REVOLUTION

After nine years of research and development, Pfizer Animal Health, the company that gives us so many good things, has come out with a do-it-all product called Revolution. This product is a heartworm preventative. It kills live fleas and ticks, kills flea eggs, eliminates roundworm and hookworm, and it also treats ear mites and mange. It is not an insecticide, it is a pharmaceutical. We are now putting it on every greyhound that comes to our facility. It is the first product of its type ever that we will sell. For a six month supply the cost is \$60.00 or \$10.00 per month. In terms of all the benefits that you get from it we believe that its a bargain. She was eventually named Skye. Skye was adopted by Mark and Susan Bozek in March, 1993 while they were living in West Chester, Pennsylvania. It could probably be said that she was certainly a handful. But the Bozeks slowly brought her back to good health and she became a member of the family. At the time Mark had a position at QVC and we even got to sell some of our greyhound wrap-around t-shirts on one of their shows for awhile. He is now the president of the Home Shopping Network and each year at picnic time we always get a donation to use for the picnic from the network. This year we got a wonderful surprise. Mark called and asked what we needed. I told him we were looking to purchase a machine that would determine to what extent each greyhound has a Von Willabrands factor (a bleeding disorder most often called hemophilia in humans). Mark and Susan personally donated enough money for us to buy the machine that we were looking for. He recently called me to say there would be an added bonus - Home Shopping Network just agreed to match funds and they will match his donation! Then too, Mark feels he will be able to send us leftover items sold on TV that do not need to be returned to the vendors and we can subsequently use these items to raise money for our ongo-

I recently received a call from an advocate in the Ft. Myers, Florida area and she asked me about what we could do. A few nights before at the Ft. Myers track, a small female came out of the starting box incorrectly, got turned around, and managed to get hit by the mechanical rabbit as it whirled around the track. The poor dog was literally impaled onto the railing mechanism and cried out in agony. From what we understand, she remained there for twenty minutes crying and moaning. The track vet was nowhere to be found. Ultimately, she was removed and had to be euthanized because of the severity of her injuries.

We wonder why the track could not have sent someone to remove her from the railing. It must have been pretty horrible because the track refunded everyone's admission fee that had to watch this horrible event.

RACING IN FLORIDA IS NOT GETTING BETTER!

GIVE ME A BREAK!

This article is not meant to be critical of veterinarians in general, but we routinely see greyhounds that visit us either for boarding or dental related issues and find generally the same thing. The same thing is that most vets don't like to deal with a greyhound's mouth. If they do clean their teeth, it is usually not done as often as it should be. Most of the doctors leave significant root exposure that builds up tartar within the dog's mouth and starts sending bacteria into our dog's blood stream. Our position is very clear. Even though adopters may not like to hear it. Your greyhound doesn't forage in the forest to find their evening's meal. Most don't chew their food. Their teeth just help to keep their tongue in their mouth and certainly help when we feed them snacks. Why do we feed them snacks? To keep their teeth clean. Probably one of the most positive investments our adopters can make is to remove all of the teeth that your dog doesn't need. The best place to do that is the NGAP Clinic and the reasons are simple. We do more dental work than anyone else. We do more greyhound anesthesia than anyone else. We do more extractions than anyone else. Our doctors have the expertise to properly suture gum tissue when there is hardly any gum tissue to close the wound. Most vets don't do extractions because they're not skilled at it and subsequently put it off. That doesn't do your greyhound any good. The last reason to bring your dog to us is because our fees are far lower than other vets because we are not driven by profit.

Eagle Scout Accused of Selling Greyhounds For Research

We recently learned that Eagles talent scout Dan Shonka of Cedar Rapids, lowa is under investigation by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the Wisconsin Gaming Commission. Allegedly he accepts Greyhounds from kennel operators for the purpose of adoption then sells them up to \$400.00 each for medical research. In prior investigations it has always been found that Greyhounds sold for research that the owners never give permission for that to happen.

Mr. Shonka is also a Class B animal dealer, a Class B dealer, (licensed by the USDA) acquires animals and sells them for research, but they don't breed animals for the purpose of research. Much of the responsibility for the abuse of the animals that go in to research can be laid at the door step of the USDA. Whatever they do, they do ever so slowly. They rarely have significant penalties and they live in a world of there own. Accepting constructive suggestions from the outside community is not something they readily accept. Our dealing with the USDA, finds them inept and uncaring. It would appear in this particular case, that Mr. Shonka used his credentials as an Eagle scout to help him gain credibility and access to our Greyhounds. You might be interested in dropping a note to the Eagles, United States Department of Agriculture, or Wisconsin Gaming Commission.

Empty Stomach Syndrome


Each year we receive calls from adopters about Greyhounds not eating, growly stomach, eating grass, and sometimes throwing up bile. We deal with that subject in your adoption manual. But we will revisit this now. There are times when Greyhounds for one reason or another go off normal eating habits. To us normal eating is twice a day, once in the morning and one more time late afternoon or early evening. When food enters your Greyhounds stomach it begins to metabolize, if it runs out of food to metabolize we get Empty Stomach Syndrome. That's why two meals a day are so important. Not every Greyhound metabolizes is food at the same speed. If your dog is a finicky eater to begin with it is get out of sync.

Ways to cure the problem.

Begin feeding three meals a day, at the last feeding, feed 1/3 of your Greyhounds total consumption of food around 8 - 9 at night. If you begin a three meal a day routine, your Greyhound will continue to metabolize and will not get Empty Stomach Syndrome. Sometimes it is necessary to jump start the process. You can do this by purchasing a loaf type can food like Hill's Canine Maintenance. Taking a tablespoon of the food in the palm of your hand and squeezing it until you get something that looks like your thumb. When you have about six of these little torpedoes made. Using one hand open your Greyhounds mouth, with the your other hand using your index finger push your torpedo like food down your Greyhound's throat, close it's mouth, wait a few seconds and repeat the procedure. By doing this you are putting food into your Greyhounds stomach, in about 15 minutes your dog will be feeling better and begin eating.

Summer Shedding

Greyhounds don't shed much, but they do shed! They probably shed more when the weather changes, don't be alarmed if you see your Greyhound shedding. A good brushing routine with a grooming mitt is the best thing to avoid hair around the house. A spring bath is also helpful.

Chemicals On Your Lawn

If you want a nice lawn, you usually have to fertilize it, if you wish to get rid of pests you have to use a spray. Can it be done safely? The key element is segregating the lawn. Invest in a low cost plastic or metal fence. Only do one section at a time. When you do each section it is important to wait at least two good rain falls in the area where the dogs can't go before switching to another area. Try not to spray or fertilize up to the fenced area, stay five feet back. Don't fertilize or spay when it's windy! Following this procedure you can either do half of your lawn or depending on the layout of your lawn, break it down in separate applications. The fence that you purchase this year, can be used for many years

"NO DIE BOSS"

National Greyhound Adoption Program, I am writing this letter with a broken heart. Our greyhound, Boss, had to be put down on Nov 15th. He had a very aggressive bone cancer. What started out as an inflammation in about 4 weeks was the end of this beautiful dog. Boss was a quiet, steady, patient and loving dog. His only fault was he would eat anything he could sink his teeth into (food).

He came into our lives on May 6, 1995 when we came to get him in Philadelphia. He came into a family of me, my husband, my grandson (then 6) and a granddaughter (then 4 1/2) both with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder and the granddaughter with a severe speech disability- which she still has. He was for all of us - but he bonded with Kelly, my granddaughter, completely and she to him. She speaks very little, but when I came back from the vets on that Monday, she screamed for almost an hour, "No die Boss", "No die Boss" over and over. She was heart broken and one of her best words was his name - "Boss".

Boss was loved by many people, our vets, their staff, neighbors, our bank president and the lady who did his nails. Everyone who found out were very upset and he will be dearly missed. He was also a good ambassador in getting the message out about the rescued greyhounds. Everywhere we'd go the conversation would go to how they were rescued. I know personally of 2 adoptions directly attributed to Boss and hopefully more.

I wasn't active in the things you do because of the extra time raising grandchildren with disabilities at my age. My responsibilities were to my family and Boss. But we did spread the word about Boss, his rescue and the plight of other greyhounds. My husband would always say, "Don't ask about our grandchildren or our dog", because I would go on non stop!

Boss was buried in our yard with his own special markers made by our grandchildren. The teacher (Special Ed teacher for both children) and their class mates made sympathy cards in the shape of bones for Boss.

I am including the veterinarian's name and address and if you would like a copy of Boss's illness he will gladly help in anyway; I asked if he would.

We will be getting another dog in the next few months, but I think from a shelter near us. As much as I would love to get another greyhound every time I think of it I cry and my heart just aches terribly. It hurts very badly just to see another greyhound. We have the greyhound license plate and that will be Boss' tribute.

I thank you for the opportunity of having Boss for the 4 years and 4 1/2 months. We had dogs of all kinds for 30 years, but he was the best and will never be forgotten.

They even feed me in my little one room apartment, such as it is. I eat when I am fed and no one tells me not to eat something within my reach. I am not asked if I have to "go outside". I have a name, but no one seems to use it. I am placed in a large area and I then find out what I am suppose to do. I am on a routine, and I like that. I am always in a fenced area so I know of no danger. I can run without any obstacles in my way and I know the fence protects me. I play with my pack, because I am a pack animal. The only humans I see are the "waiters and restroom attendants". I get so excited when they come, that I put my feet on them and jump and romp for attention. Do I know better?... Surely you jest!

No one comes and goes in the kennel without my knowledge. There are no surprises, no strange noises, no children, no other breed of dogs. There are no stairs or glass doors to run through. The only thing I look forward to is being taken out of my crate for a race. Will I win? I have no control of my life, my heart or my soul. I must win or my fate is uncertain.

The fleas and ticks bite me and my so called apartment is rough on my tender skin. The shredded paper is not soft and warm but I am lucky to have it. Sometimes I don't feel like racing but I still must perform for the crowd. After all they have a \$2.00 bet on me. If they only knew that losing one more time could seal my fate - DEATH! Some of my pals are injured on the track and I never see them again. I know I have parasites in my body for I never seem to gain weight. My teeth need cleaning but no one seems to care.

I hear there are adoption groups for dogs like me and maybe I will be lucky and they will pick me. Will they refuse me because of my color or sex? What can I do to please them? If I am adopted I hope the person will be patient with me because I have never had any control of my short life. I have never been ask to do anything for myself. I hope they will come to think of me as a member of the family and give me a life long commitment of love and of care......

Tipper the Greyhound had sad beginnings-Races and cages and losses and winnings. But the creator died that we be blessed With this long - legged beauty in a green and white vest.



Muzzles, Muzzles, Where Are The Muzzles?

For every adoption we do to families that have a cat, we give out a muzzle. Once you are sure your cat and your greyhound get along, you should return the muzzle to our office. We are now running out of muzzles. We try to keep our costs down and don't charge the new adopter for their muzzles. So if you have a muzzle and no longer need it please return it to us as soon as possible.

DONATING BLOOD

Recently in each of the newsletters, we asked adopters to bring in greyhounds to become blood donors. Blood donors help save the lives of other greyhounds. As we become more sophisticated in the operation of our surgical facility the use of blood becomes even more important. Many veterinary clinics don't do blood transfusion work particularly due to the expense of the client as well as the lack of skills, our situation is different. When we need blood it's because a greyhound is hemorrhaging and needs life saving help. Many greyhounds will not qualify but it is important that you know that your greyhound may have a potential bleeding problem. This year we have begun a research program that has never been done before on greyhounds. We will test greyhounds for Von Willebrands disease, in humans known as Hemophilia, A.C.T. Test (activated clotting time), and Bocul Mucosal clotting, which is when blood is drawn from the gum to check clotting time. Thus far the testing would indicate that most Greyhounds are below normal on the Von Willebrands test, and as high as 50% of greyhounds may be carrying Von Willebrands disease. If you bring your Greyhound in to be a blood donor; we would ask you to do it 3 to 4 times a year. If your greyhound passes the A.C.T. Test, we will do the other tests for free and pass this information back to you. Giving blood will not hurt your greyhound, at the same time you will get a free nail clipping and ear cleaning. You will be here less than 1 hour from beginning to end.


Dewey Beach 2000



And What Do We Do?

Obviously, everyone knows that we rescue and adopt greyhounds. When greyhounds come in, although each one is a rescue, it can be considered as routine. Other times it is more dramatic. Late last year on three separate occasions, we received calls from Oklahoma, two greyhounds were taken in by a local shelter in Tulsa, Oklahoma. They remained at the shelter for a long time until someone called us. We had them driven from Oklahoma to Dallas, Texas then flown to us. On two separate occasions in a short period of time we received calls from Oklahoma. The last was the most dramatic. A Greyhound we later named Ariel, had been found in a trash dumpster with her legs tied. She too was driven from Oklahoma to Dallas and you can't imagine how scared she was. To compound her fright, after being here a short time, she jumped from her cage and fractured her leg. She is now doing well and her new home is with the Tereszcuk family.

One of the strong roles we play, is that of being the grey-hounds advocate. We get involved in numerous events throughout the U.S. each year. After this article there are two articles, one has been sent to the United States Department of Agriculture and the other to that National media.

After reading this you will have some idea of how important your donations are in helping us continue our efforts.

"MEDIA RELEASE"

No, one apparently suspected Dan Shonka of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, a greyhound kennel operator, certified adoption representative for the state of Wisconsin, football scout for the Philadelphia Eagles and University of Iowa, that he had another job title. Dan Shonka was a class B animal dealer. Shonka was licensed by the U.S.D.A. A class B dealer acquires animals from owners with their permission to be used for research. The critical thing is the word "Permission". Without it you may presume that the animals are illegally acquired. It is easy to acquire greyhounds. They simply grade off (stop winning) and they're surplus and disposable, often many don't care if they're killed as some in greyhound racing would say" We can't feed them forever".

The United States Department of Agriculture was asleep. According to the Animal Welfare Act, inspectors are supposed to check 10% of the animals a dealer sells for research. This trace back is supposed to assure the U.S.D.A that the animals were acquired legally. They apparently checked none of Shonka's. The State Gaming Commission of Wisconsin, that prides itself, as having the best regulation of any state having greyhound racing saw nothing unusual. Shonka may have sold 1,500 greyhounds in three years at \$400.00 each, he amassed \$600,000.00 through the sale of greyhounds. Who caught with Shonka? Was it the U.S.D.A.? Was it Wisconsin? NO! Sherry Cottner, from North Carolina caught Shonka. Using the Freedom of Information act; Cottner found that Shonka had sold greyhounds to the Veterans Administration. It was the tip of the iceberg, and it was the key in unraveling Shonka's deception. Cardiac Pacemakers of Minnesota, a manufacturer of pacemakers, apparently took in many greyhounds to shock their hearts until it caused Cardiac Arrest. They called it quality control. The Greyhound Protection League, based in California and others have teamed up to retrieve any greyhounds that are still alive. The Greyhound Protection League has hired an attorney that is presently negotiating for their release from Cardia Pacemakers. And also they are collecting notarized releases from the greyhound owners to have the greyhound released for adoption. This is an ongoing investigation of advocates, Wisconsin Gaming Commission, and the U.S.D.A

This is not the first time advocates have found the U.S.D.A or universities either negligent or exploitive and even corrupt in their handling of greyhounds. A few years ago Mississippi State Veterinary University took in greyhounds for terminal hip replacement surgery. They were mostly acquired from the guard at the Green Track gate. Although owners wanted their dogs released MSU promised but never did. The U.S.D.A. did not find against MSU.

Colorado State University used to take in almost 1,000 greyhound annually. They would use 350 for "studies" and just kill the rest. The greyhounds used for the studies were used only for terminal surgery and their limbs were harvested and used elsewhere. There are photos of greyhound body parts stacked in trash cans. Colorado State now gets zero greyhounds and had to change their teaching methods.

Dr. Harry F. Roland of Round Rock, Texas was recently arrested for abuse of greyhound in his care. One particular greyhound suffered a fracture of the leg and the dressings weren't changed for a month an a half. Late last year, I flew in a greyhound found in a trash dumpster in Oklahoma. Ariel, under two years old, was found with her legs tied, and scared to death.

Greyhound racing has been an industry that has operated under a "code of silence". Advocates are slowing breaking through that code. Greyhound racing now has to look over their shoulder all the time! The racing industry long believed they could silence advocates by pressuring them They would require a neutral position on racing or not be given dogs for adoption. It worked for many years. In Massachusetts advocates acquired over 100,000 signatures in an attempt to abolish greyhound racing on the November ballot. It is on the ballot. The Greyhound Story is intense. Activities of advocates are intense; the "Playing Field" is becoming more level. This is a story that needs to be told.

Dear Dr. DeHaven:

Once again greyhounds have been done in by the United States Department of Agriculture. Your field inspector for years never bothered to check if the 1,500 greyhounds Mr. Dan Shonka took in were obtained with required permission from it's owners. It's so easy for a USDA inspectior to call the National Greyhound Association and give tattoo numbers, get the phone numbers of the registered owner and ask this simple question: Did you give permission for you greyhound to be used for <u>research</u>? We feel the chorus will say <u>NO!</u>

A start to solving the problem is for the USDA to send a simple memo to the field reminding inspectors that greyhounds are tattooed and it's really easy to see if the owners gave permission for their dog to be used as a research animal. It know that the USDA has ongoing education for field personnel. I am sure that my time could be made available to walk inspectors through the process of checking to see if acquiring these dogs is being done legitmately. I am also sure that someone from the racing industry would be available for the same purpose. I was just informed that three greyhound owners, John Thomas (785) 338-2431, Becky Boyce (319) 252-1407 and Diana Buck (913) 788-1521, had given dogs to Dan Shonka in the past two weeks. They contacted the USDA and have not even received a response. Where are their dogs? If you have a problem filing suit against the research facility, we don't. Let us get them back if they're still alive.

I know the United States Department of Agriculture is always short staffed, and never has enough money to do all of the tasks it would like to do. Therefore, I am making you the following offer: Throughout the United States, I will provide people to go to every research facility and read the tattoo numbers of every greyhound currently being used for research. We will then contact the National Greyhound Association to procure names and addresses of every owner. We will then contact every owner indicating that if permission was given for their dog to be used in research. We will obtain a notarized statement from them if permission was not given and submit this information back to the USDA. We will do your work and do it for free. We will also see how many greyhounds were legally acquired for research. I await your response.

We will be sending a copy of this letter to the following: Dateline, 60 Minutes, 48 Hours and various legislators.

Bronx- A white and black male born June 92', wonderful dog, but no cate, no small children, but is absolutely wonderful.

Uncle- A brindle male born august 94', strong, playful dog, was returned because he was being left alone to long, no cats.

Toshbia and Antech Put the Screws to NGAP

Antech Diagnostics the largest animal diagnostic company in the country has been doing our blood work for years. They would receive an average of \$800.00 per month from us. Last year when we began blood coagulation studies using Von Willebrands tests, they also did these for us. Unfortunately, the samples we submitted sometimes the tube was not full of blood, which it should have been. It took us over a year and over 40 tests to find out, that we were making a mistake. We were told by an Antech consultant, that antech's position is that we should have known and they weren't obligated to tell us the samples were incorrectly submitted. We believe they should have told us and apparently so does everyone else we have spoken with. We asked for a credit or refund, they have refused to do that, subsequently little NGAP will have to take Antech to court for \$1,200.00. We relied on information that they gave us, to determine whether or not to perform surgery. You would expect their protocol for accepting blood samples would be that the samples are correct.

Toshiba Easy Lease is a subsidiary of Toshiba. Over three years ago we leased a copy machine, on a lease to purchase agreement. We diligently made 36 payments of \$195.00. We told the Toshiba dealer at the time the lease was drawn, that we exercised our option to purchase the machine at the end of the lease. In speaking with dealer we were told, that they notify the customer at the end of each lease, they did not notify us. But Easy Lease continued to bill us for four additional months, and we continued to pay \$195.00. When we realized our error, we had made more payments then the option amount. They wanted their pound of flesh! They refused to let us have the machine and wanted more money. Apparently our attorney Gary Jaffe, who works for us on a pro bono basis, will be very busy with Toshiba and Antech. If you plan to buy a copier or a TV consider buying another brand! In our eyes these are just big crooks.


First Time Ever - Caricatures By Ellen
